**OPENING PRAYER:** Let us pray to our Father for the gift of peace. Father of heaven and earth, hear our prayers, and show us the way to peace in the world.

### LITURGY OF THE WORD OF GOD: 1st Reading: I Samuel 3 v. 3~10, 19.

Samuel is sleeping at the shrine of Shiloh when he hears a call from the Lord. The old priest Eli instructs him to respond to it, which he does with a listening heart.

Samuel was lying in the sanctuary of the Lord, where the ark of God was, when the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' He answered, 'Here I am.' Then he ran to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli said, 'I did not call. Go back and lie down.' So he went and lay down. Once again the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' He replied, 'I did not call you, my son; go back and lie down.' Samuel had as yet no knowledge of the Lord and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. Once again the Lord called me.' Eli then understood that it was the Lord who was calling the boy, and he said to Samuel, 'Go and lie down, and if someone calls say, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening."' So Samuel went and lay down in his place. The Lord then came and stood by, calling as he had done before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel answered, 'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.'

## RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Ps. 39 ® Here I am Lord! I come to do Your will.

I waited, I waited for the Lord and He stooped down to me; He heard my cry.

He put a new song into my mouth, praise of our God

You do not ask for sacrifice and offerings, but an open ear. You do not ask for holocaust and victim. Instead, here am I.®

In the scroll of the book it stands written that I should do your will. My God, I delight in your law in the depth of my heart. ® Your justice I have proclaimed in the great assembly. My lips I have not sealed; you know it, O Lord.® **2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 6 v. 13-15, 17-20** St. Paul addresses the problem of immoral sexual practices in the Corinthian community. The body of the community is the dwelling place of the Spirit; community and casual sexual living do not go together. The body is not meant for fornication: it is for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. God,

who raised the Lord from the dead, will by his power raise us up too. You know, surely, that your bodies are members making up the body of Christ; do you think I can take parts of Christ's body and join them to the body of a prostitute? Never! But anyone who is joined to the Lord is one spirit with him.

Keep away from fornication. All the other sins are committed outside the body; but to fornicate is to sin against your own body. Your body, you know, is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you since you received him from God. You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for. That is why you should use your body for the glory of God.

#### Gospel Hymn: 346 v 3

Acclamation: (All) Alleluia! Alleluia! Speak, Lord, your servant is listening: You have the message of eternal life. Alleluia!

**Gospel Reading: John 1: v. 35-42** John the Baptist directs two of his own disciples towards Jesus. They follow Jesus, stay with him and tell others about their own experiences of meeting the Messiah.

As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, 'Look, there is the lamb of God.' Hearing this, the two disciples followed Jesus. Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, 'What do you want?' They answered, 'Rabbi,' – which means Teacher – 'where do you live?' 'Come and see' he replied; so they went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour.

One of these two who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' – which means the Christ – and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas' - meaning Rock. The next day, after Jesus had decided to leave for Galilee, he met Philip and said, 'Follow me.' Philip came from the same town, Bethsaida, as Andrew and Peter, Philip found Nathanael and said to him, 'We have found him of whom Moses in the Law and the prophets wrote, Jesus son of Joseph, from Nazareth.' Nathanael said to him, 'From Nazareth? Can anything good come from that place?' Philip replied, 'Come and see,' When Jesus saw Nathanael coming he said of him. 'There, truly, is an Israelite in whom there is no deception.' Nathanael asked, 'How do you know me?' Jesus replied, 'Before Philip came to call you, I saw you under the fig tree.' Nathanael answered, 'Rabbi, you are the Son of God, you are the king of Israel.' Jesus replied, 'You believe that just because I said: I saw you under the fig tree. You are going to see greater things than that.' And then he added, 'In all truth I tell you, you will see heaven open and the angels of God ascending and descending over the Son of man.'
