LITURGY OF THE WORD OF GOD

1st Reading: Isaiah 52 v 7-10: This reading is part of a long poem on the deliverance of Jerusalem. It is used in the Christmass liturgy because the coming of Christ heralds the deliverance of all mankind from sin.

How beautiful on the mountains, are the feet of one who brings good news, who heralds peace, brings happiness, proclaims salvation, and tells Zion, 'Your God is king!' Listen! Your watchmen raise their voices, they shout for joy together, for they see the Lord face to face, as he returns to Zion. Break into shouts of joy together, you ruins of Jerusalem; for the Lord is consoling his people, redeeming Jerusalem. The Lord bares his holy arm in the sight of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 97

® All the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our God.

Sing a new song to the Lord for he has worked wonders.

His right hand and his holy arm have brought salvation.

The Lord has made known his salvation;

has shown his justice to the nations.

He has remembered his truth and love for the house of Israel. ®

All the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our God.

Shout to the Lord all the earth, ring out your joy. ®

Sing psalms to the Lord with the harp, with the sound of music. With trumpets and the sound of the horn acclaim the King, the Lord.®

Second Reading: Hebrews 1 v 1-6: In the letter to the Hebrews we are told how God reveals himself to man in many ways: in creation; in the Law; in the words of the prophets; and finally and definitively in his Son Jesus. In Jesus we have all that we can know of God. As Jesus manifests the Father to us, so must we manifest him to one another.

At various times in the past and in various different ways, God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets; but in our own time, the last days, he has spoken to us through his Son, the Son that he has appointed to inherit everything and through whom he made everything there is. He is the radiant light of God's glory and the perfect copy of his nature, sustaining the universe by his powerful command; and now that he has destroyed the defilement of sin, he has gone to take his place in heaven at the right hand of divine Majesty. So he is now as far above the angels as the title which he has inherited is higher than their own name.

God has never said to any angel: You are my Son, today I have become your father; or: I will be a father to him and he a son to me. Again, when he brings the First-Born into the world, he says: Let all the angels of God worship him.

Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! A hallowed day has dawned upon us. Come, you nations, worship the Lord, for today a great light has shone down upon the earth. Alleluia!

Gospel Hymn: 30

Gospel: John 1 v. 1-5; 9-14: John is telling us that the Word of God, who has been with God from all eternity has become Man in the person of Jesus. By accepting him, we become children of his Father and will live for ever.

In the beginning was the Word: and the Word was with God and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things came to be, not one thing had its being but through him. All that came to be had life in him and that life was the light of men, a light that shines in the dark, a light that darkness could not overpower.

The Word was the true light that enlightens all men; and he was coming into the world. He was in the world that had its being through him, and the world did not know him He came to his own domain and his own people did not accept him. But to all who did accept him he gave power to become children of God, to all who believe in the name of him who was born not out of human stock or urge of the flesh or will of man but of God himself.

The Word was made flesh, he lived among us, and we saw his glory, the glory that is his as the only Son of the Father, full of grace and truth.

Creed. Nicene Creed (Kneel as an act of humility at *Incarnatus (after: "He came down from Heaven" .. (to).."and was made Man".)*

Let us pray for those people for whom this Christmass period will be one of pain, sickness or loneliness. For all suffering from sickness and all recently bereaved.

Let us pray for those who have not yet seen the light of Christ; for those who cannot recognize and accept the truth.

Let us pray for the dead; for all our departed family and friends and for those commemorated in the Parish and American Chantry Books and by the Guild of All Souls and also for Edith Sawyer, Margaret Owen-King, Valerie Keeble, Dick Finbow, Esme Laidlaw, Irene Bennett, Terry Warren, Graham Lockwood, Eva Abbott, Kathleen Carter, Jane Deacon, Joan Little, Hilda Goodall, Kitty Mason, Jack Driver and Lucy Jolley, whose anniversaries are this week.

Let us ask Mary the Mother of Jesus to join her prayer to ours. Hail Mary full of grace the Lord is with thee, blessed art thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.
