PARISH CHURCH OF ST. MARY THE VIRGIN, MENDLESHAM The Feast of Corpus Christi

LITURGY OF THE WORD OF GOD

First Reading – Deut. 8v.2-3; 14-16. The author exhorts the people to remember they are God's people who need to nourish themselves on his word. Do not forget all the Lord has done for you.

'Moses said to the people: 'Remember how the Lord your God led you for forty years in the wilderness, to humble you, to test you and know your inmost heart — whether you would keep his commandments or not. He humbled you, he made you feel hunger, he fed you with manna which neither you nor your fathers had known, to make you understand that man does not live on bread alone but that man lives on everything that comes from the mouth of the Lord.

'Do not become proud of heart. Do not forget the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery: who guided you through this vast and dreadful wilderness, a land of fiery serpents, scorpions, thirst; who in this waterless place brought you water from the hardest rock; who in this wilderness fed you with manna that your fathers had not known."

RESPONSORIAL PSALM - Psalm 147® O praise the Lord, Jerusalem

O praise the Lord, Jerusalem! Zion, Praise your God;

He has strengthened the bars of your gates; he has blessed the children within you.

He established peace on your borders, he feeds you with finest wheat.

He sends out his word to the earth and swiftly runs his command. ®

He makes his word known to Jacob, to Israel his laws and decrees.

He has not dealt thus with other nations; he has not taught them his decrees. ®

Second Reading – 2 Cor.10v.16-17. In the Eucharist we all share the same bread, and so, however many we are, we form one body in Christ.

'The blessing-cup that we bless is a communion with the blood of Christ, and the bread that we break is a communion with the body of Christ. The fact that there is only one loaf means that, though there are many of us, we form a single body because we all have a share in this one loaf.'

Gospel Hymn: 219 v.4

(All) Alleluia, alleluia! I am the living bread which has come down from heaven, says the Lord. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever. Alleluia!

THE HOLY GOSPEL - John 6v.51-58. As food and drink nourish the body, so Christ nourishes us for this life and everlasting life.

'Jesus said to the crowd: 'I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I shall give is my flesh, for the life of the world.'

Then the Jews started arguing with one another: 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' they said.

Jesus replied: 'I tell you most solemnly, if you do not eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you will not have life in you. Anyone who does eat my flesh and drink my blood has eternal life, and I shall raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood lives in me and I live in him. As I, who am sent by the living Father, myself draw life from the Father, so whoever eats me will draw life from me. This is the bread come down from heaven; not like the bread our ancestors ate: they are dead, but anyone who eats this bread will live for ever."

ADDRESS CREED Apostles' Creed – P8 of hymn book PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL

<u>Celebrant</u>: As one body we pray to the Living Father who gives life to the world.

We pray for the sick – for Margaret Maundrell, Billy Carter, Jim Wilson, Angie Wilson and all to be anointed at the healing service on Thursday.

We ask the Lord to bring all the dead to the joy of the heavenly feast where they will be with him forever. We remember especially Barbara Pyett, Hugh Cutting, Henry Webb, Alan Gooderham, Eddie Derrick, Beatrice Stannard, Russell Pipe, Eileen Wren, Edith Pelham, Ken Gray, Peter Williamson, Peter Gowlett, Eva Baker, Cecily Garrard, Margaret Stannard, Katherine Fletcher, Jean Davey and Jean Taylor, whose anniversaries occur at this time.
